Strengths:

- ❖ We have sufficient land with an extent of 17.16 acres.
- ***** The institution has own building.
- The Institution has total number of 753 students in Eleven Courses.
- Apart from Conventional Courses, we have restructured courses like B.Com (Computer Applications and B.Sc (Computer Science). We are also having UGC Add-on courses (Web Design and Computer Networking). The College also offering Certificate Courses like Tally, PC Software and 'C '-Language, Spoken English and Communication Skills.
- The Institution has 29 sanctioned posts in which 25 members are Regular Lecturers and 1 member is Contract Faculty. Among the faculty working in the Institution, 14 members are having Ph.D Degree.
- College conducts Add-on Courses in Web Design, Computer Networking, 'C'-Language which promotes the student skills suitable to present job markets.

Weaknesses:

BLOOD DONATION: SERVICE TO THE COMMUNITY

1. GOAL:

Academicians strongly believe that traditional classroom instruction with community-service enhances the learning experience of the students and civic participation. The college's focus for community improvement and engagement connects academic program with community service.

The context:

Service to Community in the fields of literacy health, hygiene and agriculture is the need of the hour in India. So, students, faculty and community partners can forge linkage between theory and practice, between knowledge and action and between the resources of institution and the community development.

2. Practice:

Government Degree College, Nagari organizes regular blood donation camps, during the last four years, in collaboration with Lions Club and the Government Hospital. The Institution aims at ensuring easy accessibility and adequate supply of safe and quality blood and blood components collected from voluntary blood donors, particularly this college Students to those in need. The blood is stored and transported under optimum conditions with the help of Government Hospital technical staff. Transfusion is always under the supervision of trained personnel. Under the policy, blood transfusion is available to people irrespective of their economic or social status. Total Quality Management approach has ensured smooth conduct of Blood Donation Camps.

3. Evidence of Success:

The voluntary blood donation camps have resulted in great impact on the students as well as teachers. In every Blood Donation Camp more than 150 Students and other Volunteers from NCC, NSS, RRC have donated Blood. The impact is also apparent on personality development, moral education and on civic responsibility and is reflected in reduced indiscipline and enhanced sense of the responsibility among the students towards the college. It has also created a sense of managerial ability among the students for organizing such type of events in the college.

4. Problems encountered:

Obstacles faced include: Being a Rural and backward area, Nagari, has inadequacy of resources. Students particularly women students are not well fed but under weight and malnourished. Non-availability of any strategies of latest technology for operating the blood transfusion services and lack of extensive awareness programs.

NOTE:

Community is engaged for raising financial resources for required conducting various programmes of blood donation successfully. Efforts are also made to make the blood transfusion services viable through non-profit recovery system.

BEST PRACTICES

Training of Women students in floral arrangement:

This training of decoration, beautification, bouquet making is undertaken by the Women empowerment cell in the Institution.

1. Goal:

The main object of this practice is they can keep their homes clean, tidy and in a well decorated way. We feel that making women students aware of home decoration, beautification, bouquet making is the first priority and remains for lifelong. Hence we taught the women students the technique and the methods of floral arrangement. It also creates and aesthetic sense in their households. This training also creates an opportunity for them to exploit their skill for commercial purpose.

2. The Context:

Since the students come from rural poor and illiterate background, they may not be aware of many things that are related to richness. Beautification and decoration, housekeeping are such practices related to rich people. Today's girls are tomorrow's home makers. Therefore it is thought that if these skills are taught to them, they may benefit from the skills in future. Hence it is decided to take up training the women students in floral arrangement.

3. Practice:

The women students are asked to collect various types of flowers available from their surroundings, both wild and grown in gardens. In response this and the students brought many varieties of flowers. The women

Faculty of the Women empowerment cell taught them the techniques of floral arrangement and bouquet making. These skills were used when the students made floral arrangement for the three National Seminars conducted in the institution.

4. Evidence of success:

The students were enthusiastic throughout their training period. All the floral arrangement s made during the Seminars and the flower bouquets handed over to the Dignitaries are prepared by the students. This arrangement saved the Seminar Organizers thousands of rupees. Many people appreciated the efforts taken by the students in the Stage and Seminar hall floral arrangement.

5. Problems encountered:

In the beginning the students were very slow in learning as they hail from a rural background. But women are naturally adept in learning flower arrangement techniques. This floral arrangement skill is taught in cities only and the art belong to urban areas. But as the students have shown much patience and developed the flower arrangement skills.

6. Note:

It is one of the efforts of the Women empowerment cell to create a dignified way of teaching a skill to women students to exploit the skill for commercial use.

FEED BACK ANALYSIS

A total of 100 Students, Alumni and Parents are given different questionnaires and feedback is taken from them.

1. STUDENTS:

75% of the students expressed those facilities regarding class rooms and infrastructure is good. Regarding NSS and NCC 60% of the students expressed that they are good. Regarding completion of syllabus, interest generated by the Faculty, depth and content of the subject and different teaching methods used, majority of the students felt that they are very good. All the students opined that the Library and learning resources in the college are very good.

2. PARENTS:

Most of the parents belong to the Agriculture sector and only a few are self employed. Majority of the parents expressed that the Courses offered and facilities in the College are useful their wards. They also expressed good opinion about the Infrastructure facilities available in the Institution. They also expressed that implementation of reservations in the admissions is good.
